From Dr. Scott D. Miller President, Wesley College

There's no way to sugar-coat it. After 10 transformative years at Wesley College, it's excruciatingly painful to say goodbye. As most of you know, I will leave to assume the leadership of Bethany College—a small, elite liberal arts institution in Bethany, WV, effective January 1, 2008.

Likewise, there's no way to adequately thank all those in the Wesley family, the Peninsula-Delaware Conference and in the larger community, who have made such a significant impact on the momentum of the College and in the life of the Miller family. After 10 years here, we will profoundly miss Dover, the Wesley United Methodist Church and the community that we have called home and come to love. We have raised our two daughters from pre-teens to accomplished young women here and forged life-long friendships, both personally and professionally. For Katie and Ashlee, our daughters — both Caesar Rodney graduates — Dover will always be home.

Moreover, Wesley's community initiatives and partnerships with organizations including the Schwartz Center for the Arts—of which the College is now a co-owner—the Wesley Boys and Girls Club, Campus Community School, the Wesley YMCA, Barratt's Chapel and Museum and others — have been supremely rewarding. From chairing the Kent County division of the United Way of Delaware, to serving as an honorary commander of Dover Air Force Base, it has been a great ride.

It's been a memorable and highly rewarding decade. Our team has been blessed with many gifted and dedicated alumni, faculty, staff and volunteer leadership, and Wesley would not have become the outstanding institution it is today without their hard work and guidance.

Together, we have undertaken successful initiatives resulting in a tripling of the College's enrollment, a doubling of its endowment and Wesley's citation as a "Regional Best College" by *U.S. News and World Report* for the fourth consecutive year. However fulfilling these accomplishments, they are not what I will remember most about Wesley.

Rather, I'll cherish the collective "little things:" the football Saturdays in the Guzzetta President's Box at the revamped Wolverine Stadium, reveling in the Wolverines' back-to-back

NCAA Division III semi-final championships with alumni, young and old. I'll recall the first bachelor's degree in nursing being awarded, scholar-athlete Rocky Myers earning the elite Gagliardi Trophy for NCAA Division III's highest football honor, the gratifying success of the Schwartz Center for the Arts and many other community partnerships.

One of the team accomplishments of which I'm most proud is our success in blending the College's United Methodist heritage and mission with a contemporary, pluralistic campus community. Chaplain and Director of Church Relations, Mark Pruet-Barnett, has done a masterful job of promoting pluralism while at the same time furthering relations with the UMC, including working with Hope United Methodist Church here on campus.

In his acclaimed *Julius Caesar*, William Shakespeare has the Roman emperor say, "There is a tide in the affairs of men which, taken at the flood, leads on to fortune...." With Wesley on a sound footing after a decade of unprecedented growth and prosperity, Annie and I feel that this is the right time for us to move on to new challenges.

In a very real sense, we are going home. Our new campus in West Virginia's northern panhandle will be equidistant from Pennsylvania and Ohio, where Annie and I grew up, and closer to West Virginia Wesleyan College, where I earned my undergraduate degree and cut my teeth as a college sports information director, columnist and newspaper reporter. Bethany's strong tradition of liberal arts education, sense of mission and small, student-centered campus — very reminiscent of Wesley — were additional factors in our decision.

It's been said that a strong leader not only leaves an organization better than (it was) when he or she found it, but also, enables it to flourish under new

leadership. Because of the talents and dedicated efforts of so many, coupled with the College's comprehensive Master Plan, *From Here to 2010*, I believe that I have been able to do just that.

Although there is more to do, virtually everything we set out to accomplish — and then some — will have been completed in the remaining two years of the plan.

Thanks to a strong strategic process, Wesley is a vibrant, progressive institution well positioned to take advantage of new opportunities. It's time to let others build on this firm foundation while I take on new challenges.

With both girls (our eldest daughter Katie, 23, is a first year doctoral student in pharmacy at Shenandoah University in Virginia) grown and concluding their academic careers, this is a good time in the life of our family to make a move. We expect to return to the peninsula often to visit daughter Ashlee, 20, a junior at the University of Delaware, and our residence at Bethany Beach where we've shared so many happy family times.

When I came to Wesley in 1997, my vision was to take this 134-year-old institution, with its strong United Methodist tradition, to the next level of excellence. With the help of many talented men and women, we have been able to surpass my dreams for this great college. Thus, the legacy that I leave is really your legacy. Wesley's future is promising and bright because of your investment of time, talent and treasure. Thank you from the bottom of my heart. It's been a great ten years.

The College, located on a picturesque 1,300 acre campus in West Virginia's northern panhandle near Pittsburgh, PA, is the oldest private college in the state and one of the nation's elite liberal arts institutions. Founded in 1840, it offers undergraduate degrees in 30 fields of study, including pre-professional programs in dentistry, engineering, law, medicine, ministry, pharmacy, physical therapy and veterinary medicine. The College operates the Mountainside Conference Center, Campbell Mansion and Museum, and Historic Bethany Visitor Center. Bethany College is affiliated with the Disciples of Christ (Christian Church).

General Conference Spotlight

General Conference basics explored in online course

How are delegates elected to the United Methodist General Conference?

How many votes are required for the assembly to approve a petition? What is the role of bishops in the once-every-four-years gathering? And why is it important to keep a copy of the Daily Christian Advocate handy throughout the proceedings?

These and many other questions are answered in "Exploring General Conference," a five-session online course offered by United Methodist Communications for anyone wanting to learn more about the denomination's top legislative body and how it works.

The course is free and being offered to give people a basic working knowledge of the church's legislative process in advance of the 2008 General Conference. About 1,000 delegates will gather next April 23-May 2 in Fort Worth, Texas, to set church policy, approve a budget and speak on behalf of the denomination regarding social and moral issues of the day.

"The course is ideal for anyone attending the 2008 General Conference, including communicators and delegates, as well as

United Methodists interested in learning more about how the denomination makes decisions," said site administrator Cheryl A. Hemmerle.

Participants can begin the course anytime between Nov. 15 and Dec. 26 and move through the sessions at their own pace. Additional sessions will be offered from January through next May.

Launched Nov. 15, the course garnered more than 150 participants in its first three days and is expected to gain momentum as General Conference approaches, Hemmerle said.

Betty Jackson signed up because she will serve as a volunteer marshal at the 2008 meeting.

"I'm really excited about going," said Jackson, a member of Ebenezer United Methodist Church in New Johnsonville, Tenn. "I'm taking this course in hopes that it will give me an idea of what will be going on."

Arthur Sponagel is participating in "Exploring General Conference" because he wants to learn more about United Methodism. After spending most of his life in two other denominations, he has been a United Methodist since 1986.

"One thing I like about Methodism is you are expected to continue studying. I hope to learn more about how the church operates," said Sponagel of St. Paul's United Methodist Church in Las Cruces, N.M.

In addition to interactive features such as videos and quizzes, participants can participate in forums to ask questions and share ideas.

Among other things, the course includes information about:

- The history, role and purpose of General Conference;
- How delegates are elected, their role and responsibilities;
- How petitions, the general church budget and other important matters are decided through General Conference;
- Social issues facing The United Methodist Church and the denomination's stance on those issues; and
- Highlights of the 2004 General Conference and what's ahead for 2008.

Substantiation of Contributions:

Remember to provide statements for donor substantiation for 2007. The rules effect single contributions totaling \$250 or more. A written acknowledgement of the contribution must be provided by the church. The donors canceled check will no longer be sufficient to substantiate a contribution of this size.

The acknowledgement must include:

1. The donor's name.
2. A listing of each individual contribution of \$250 or more.
3. A description of any non-cash property contributed.
4. A statement that no goods or services were provided to the donor in exchange for the contribution. It is suggested that all church statements reflecting money contributions, such as quarterly giving reports, contain the following disclaimer:

"Pursuant to Internal Revenue Code requirements for substantiation of charitable contributions, _____ United Methodist Church provided no goods or services in return for these contributions."

The written acknowledgement must be provided to the donor **prior** to the date on which the donor's tax return is filed or **prior** to the due date for filing, **whichever is earlier**.

UMs Explore 'Cyber Safety' in Ministry

A UM conference exploring topics dealing with "CyberSAFEty in Ministry" met Oct. 1-3 and was sponsored by the General Board of Discipleship (GBOD). About 150 people from across the United States gathered in Nashville, Tenn., to share strategies and tools to harness the potential gift that technology promises in an environment of stewardship and safety.

"I think it's important for churches to consider a presence in cyberspace because that is where the people are," said Paul O'Briant, director of technology for Currituck County Schools in North Carolina. O'Briant cited U.S. statistics that 143 million people use the Internet and that two-thirds of Internet users have searched for spiritual topics online. In 1996, General Conference passed a resolution

calling on every church to develop policies and procedures to reduce the risk of child sexual abuse in its ministries and facilities. Regional training sessions followed, inviting conferences to send representatives who could return and train local churches on Safe Sanctuary procedures. "Cyber safety needs to be a part of our Safe Sanctuary planning and implementation," said O'Briant, noting that the church and its leaders are far from immune to the growing problem of sexual addictions. A 2000 survey by Christianity Today indicated that about 40% of clergy had acknowledged visiting sexually explicit Web sites.

"Internet safety with kids is so important because the problem is prevalent, and exposure to inappropriate material and file sharing are growing," said Tom Evans, an agent investigator with Internet

Crimes Against Children. "There is a need for legislation to put offenders behind bars for crimes against a child.

We need to increase sentencing guidelines, and stiffer penalties are needed," Evans told the conference. "Cyber safety is not a one-time event," said the Rev. Stephen Streett, an associate pastor from the North Georgia Annual Conference.

Ministry teams representing local congregations, 44 conferences, four agencies, and camping and retreat professionals were among participants at the cyber safety conference. Event organizers hope participants will return to their ministries and create policies, goals, and action plans related to the safe use of technology.

You may also be tested (in the good sense — that is, to make sure of yourself) and grow. A friendship of Christians is THE place you want to be not only when you're doing well, but also when you are going through life's tough stuff. Your friends will help you, through honest conversation and prayers, with words of encouragement and sometimes by playing the devil's advocate, to help you discern your path forward.

Give yourself a gift by surrounding yourself with other followers, each in their own place, and each willing to share life in a small group. It might be that you keep Christmas for a longer season this year if you give yourself this gift.
